2nd Canonical Books

- Deuterocanonical books (apocrypha) is a term used since the 16th century in the Catholic Church and Eastern Christianity to describe certain books and passages of the Christian Old Testament that are not part of the Hebrew Bible
- 2nd, not because they are of lesser value but because they came 2nd
- The Deuterocanonical books are considered <u>canonical</u> by Catholics and Eastern Orthodox, but are considered <u>non-canonical</u> by most Protestants. The word *Deuterocanonical* comes from the Greek meaning 'belonging to the second canon'.

Definitions

- Canon The Biblical canon is the set of books Christians regard as divinely inspired and thus constituting the Christian Bible. The Christian Biblical Canon consists of the canons of the Old and New Testaments
- **Apocrypha** Biblical or related writings not forming part of the accepted canon of Scripture. Writings or reports not considered genuine.
- Deuterocanonical Deuterocanonical books is a term used to describe certain books of the Christian Old Testament that are not part of the Bible. Books whose divine inspiration was disputed at one time but which did make the Catholic canon. Protestant Churches, which do not recognize them as inspired, call them Apocryphal

Definitions

 Septuagint – The greek version of the Old testament which consisted of the books of what we now call the Old Testament and the "Apocrypha" or Deuterocanonical Books. The coptic orthodox church has always adhered to this.






What Happened???

- In1611, when the King James Version of the Holy Bible was published it contained the Old testament, Apocrypha and New Testament
- Over time, re-prinitng of the King James version of the Holy Bible began to exclude the Apocrypha (a commonly used non-orthodox term denoting the omitted canonical books)









"History allows us to establish the fact that Christians have always believed in the inspiration of the Holy Books of the Bible. These Holy Books are held sacred and canonical, not because having been put together merely by human labor and afterwards approved by the church authority, BUT because having been written by the inspiration of the Holy spirit, they had God as their author and as such, they have been handed down to the church itself in such a way guide to her".
