- 70% of teenagers have used alcohol by the age of 14
- In 2004, 9% of Australians drank daily, 41% drank weekly and 34% drank less than weekly.
- Alcohol was responsible for nearly two out of ten drug related deaths (16 per cent) in 1996
- Some examples from the bible relating to the consequences of alcohol include;
 - Lot got drunk and slept with his daughters (Genesis 19:30-38)
 - Noah got drunk and naked in his tent (Genesis 9:20-24) Others sold girls to get wine (Joel 3:3)

Pheww... That was a close one... (cont)

- The Bible warns of the dangers of alcohol...
- Proverbs 23:31-35

Do not look on the wine when it is red, When it sparkles in the cup, When it swirls around smoothly; At the last it bites like a serpent, And stings like a viper. Your eyes will see strange things, And your heart will utter perverse things. Yes, you will be like one who lies down in the midst of the sea, Or like one who lies at the top of the mast, saying: "They have struck me, but I did not feel it. When shall I awake, that I may seek another drink?"

Not just an innocent dance, is it?

- Paul, speaking to Christians, addresses the issue of worldly practices in Ephesians 4:17-24
 - This I say, therefore, and testify in the Lord, that you should no longer walk as the rest of the Gentiles walk, in the futility of their mind, having their understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God, because of the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart; who, being past feeling, have given themselves over to lewdness, to work all uncleanness with greediness. But you have not so learned Christ, if indeed you have heard Him and have been taught by Him, as the truth is in Jesus: that you put off, concerning your former conduct, the old man which grows corrupt according to the deceitful lusts, and be renewed in the spirit of your mind, and that you put on the new man which was created according to God, in true righteousness and holiness.

Another a close one...

• There is a big risk to smoking just once.

Very soon after that first cigarette, adolescents can experience a loss of autonomy over tobacco, and recent research indicates that this loss of autonomy may play a key role in nicotine addiction.

• In 2004, 17% of Australians aged 14 years and over were daily smokers.

School aged teenagers smoke over 3.5 million cigarettes in a week

 Tobacco was responsible for about eight out of ten deaths (82 per cent) caused by drugs in 1996. Of these deaths, seven out of ten (72 per cent) were males

That could've been dangerous...

Illicit drugs

- In 2004, 38% of Australians aged 14 years and over had used an illicit drug in their lifetime and 15% in the last 12 months.
- Marijuana/cannabis was the most common illicit drug used (34% had used in their lifetime).
- In 2004, greater psychological distress was associated with marijuana/cannabis users than non-users.
- In 2005, 46% of injecting drug users had overdosed at some point in their lives.
- In 2005, one in 10 prisoners was imprisoned for drug-related offences. In 2003–04, 88% of juvenile detainees had used an illicit substance 6 months prior to arrest and 70% were intoxicated at the time of offence. Drug related deaths account for almost one in five (20 per cent) deaths among all age groups. It was estimated that in 1998, 22 500 Australians would die as a direct or indirect result of harmful drug use and over 175 ooo would be hospitalised with drug-related conditions
