Pride

The sin of pride is one that many of us fall into on a daily basis. King Solomon in all his wisdom warns us of the perils of this sin: *“Pride goes before destruction, And a haughty spirit before a fall”* (Proverbs 16:18). The sin itself is not us feeling good about ourselves, but rather not acknowledging the gifts that God has given us, and attributing all our success to ourselves. Thus, abolishing the need for God in our lives. In Daniel Chapter 4, pride was responsible for the downfall of king Nebuchadnezzar, which ultimately brought him down from king and all the comforts associated with it, to living and eating amongst animals. Daniel however, showed humility and always attributed his gift of interpretation of dreams and visions to God, and in response God made him governor over many provinces in Babylon (the land of his captivity). St. James teaches us to: *“Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and He will lift you up”* James (4:10). Likewise we too should praise and thank God continually for all our gifts, whether it be intelligence, athleticism, music, patience, public speaking, creativity etc. We must also acknowledge the working s of God in our lives in everything that we do, as king David writes in his psalms, it is *“He who has made us, and not we ourselves.. Psalm 100:3*
